Welcome back to the new academic year and I hope you are looking forward to the term ahead.

On Thursday 27 September at 6:30pm we are holding our annual Open Evening for future parents and children. Next week you will receive a copy of our new prospectus and ahead of that I am sharing a recent newspaper article about our local secondary school.

You will be able to read how last year our results placed us in the Top 10% of Hampshire schools for the increase in the proportion of pupils achieving a Grade 4 or above in English and mathematics.

The article explains that this year we built on this by setting targets to achieve in line with the top 20% of schools in the country and that in most of our subjects we met, exceeded or were exceptionally close to achieving this high level.

Across a range subjects our pupils made impressive progress which adds to the excellent progress that Ofsted reported about in October 2016 when they judged our school to be good in all areas.

Our Open Evening will provide you with the opportunity to learn about our high levels of pastoral care, meet our highly motivated pupils, speak with our excellent dedicated teachers and discover why the ethos at MCA is so strong. We will also share the plans for our new school buildings due to open in September 2019.

I do hope you find the article interesting and I look forward to meeting with you at our Open Evening on Thursday 27 September.

Students in GCSE heaven

MILL Chase Academy (MCA) is celebrating after its GCSE results improved

for the fifth year in a row. In 2017 the Herald reported a significant increase in English and mathematics at the secondary school with results rising by 10 per cent compared to the previous year.

However, this time However, this time around principal Paul Hem-mings challenged teachers and students to match the performance of the top 20 per cent of schools in the country, using the Fischer Family Trust national system

tem.
"This year, eight subjects met or exceeded these high targets and a further six subjects were incredibly close with just under twofifths of a grade below on average," he said. "It is clear that when you

couple high quality pastoral care with high standards and expectations, a school allows young people to flourish and to achieve their

rouns and to achieve their very best."
Following government reforms, 2017 saw mathematics, English language and English literature exams adopting the new ratings system of 1-9, grade 9 being the bird 9 being the highest possi-ble mark. And this year a further 20 subjects moved over to the new scheme and dropped the traditional -G gradings.

A*-G gradings.

The courses were also said to include "more demanding content".

Mr Hemmings highlighted outgoing head girl Emily Morgan, who achieved ten grade 9s and one grade 8 in her GCSEs. one grade 8 in her GCSEs She also achieved an A^ in further mathematics, the highest grade in the qualification which covers some of the A-level maths

"Once again, these ex-

cellent results are testament to the talented and committed teachers that we have at Mill Chase who work in excellent partnership with supportive parents and hard working students at our school," he added.

Staff at MCA are preparing to move into their new building, currently under construction at Budds Lane.

Mr Hemmings said this as "an exciting time" for Mill Chase, which will ben-efit from state-of-the-art facilities, including modern science and technology laboratories, a performing arts centre, dance studio, 320-seat theatre, 4G pitch, six court sports hall, multi use games space and a forest school learning area.

There is also far more green space than at the school's current home, which will enable several sports pitches, an athletics track, a 'nurture garden and more.

Sited to the north of what will be the relocated town centre, the brand new, 900-place secondary school buildings are set to cost approximately £30 million There is also space on site for a future expansion.

Hampshire County Council (HCC) is investing £10 million towards the total cost. The remainthe total cost. The remain-ing balance is coming from

the Whitehill and Bordon Regeneration Con Homes England, Company, East Hampshire District Council, and the Education and

Skills Funding Agency.

The works will be finished in 2019, allowing MCA students to move in for the start of the autumn

term.
"As I have said many times before, one of the most important roles I have as principal is to ensure that the very best teachers re-main at the academy while appointing high-quality, talented staff," Mr Hemmings said.

"Last term, I made several excellent appointments to our teaching team, all of whom will join us at the start of September. This will strengthen the school even further as we work to provide an outstanding education for the young people of Whitehill and Bordon."

"The young people who have just finished their GCSEs or A-levels have completed a really key stage in their education, gaining important knowl-edge and skills for their future success. My congratulations to all the students in East Hampshire, and their families and their teachers, for what they've

"Responding to employers and universities, back in 2011 the government initiated a review of the curric-ulum and reform of public exams. We are seeing that coming through now in the reformed GCSEs and A-levels, which better pre-pare students for the next step in their journey. But it is really important that the system is fair to each year's cohort of students, and in-deed we have seen the pass rates and proportion of entrants getting a Grade A Grade 7 stay broadly constant year on year.

"How we educate our young people could not be more important, both for our future economic suc-cess and for the self-fulfilment of the individuals. The more rigorous content better prepares people for the world of work or further study, and is now on par with expectations in other countries with high performing education systems. Whatever they choose to do next, these qualifications will young people a solid base that they can build on

Stephen Reid, executive member for education and skills, human resources and performance at Hampshire County Council, said: "I'd like to say a huge 'well done' to all Hampshire students who will have worked hard to meet the more rigorous standards of

the new GCSE curriculum We have still to receive results from a small number of schools but from the information we've been sent so far, we believe there is a really positive set of results for Hampshire which look to be comfortably above the national average."
